KBDM - Five Key Elements (can be found on Slide #15 of the KBDM PowerPoint)

- 1. **Open communication between leadership and membership**. Area Officers utilize questionnaires and other forms of communication to help come to an informal consensus on an idea. Perhaps three or four people have mentioned the same thing. Or we may have received emails making a suggestion.
- 2. **Dialogue before deliberation.** We will use the Thought Force process in a few different ways to generate dialogue across the membership.
- 3. All decision-makers have common access to full information. All background and pertinent information will be shared with whoever will be making the decisions. Once particular decisions or recommendations are made, then the process moves forward.
- 4. We exist in a culture of trust. This is our recovery in action. We become reliable and learn to rely on others. We become truthful, and rely on the truth from others. Many times we simply need more information to gain the understanding that lets us lighten our load and experience trust.
- 5. **Confidence in our partners.** I am not the ultimate authority, and I can "let it begin with me" to help create the culture of trust that helps us all to recover.

KBDM Process (can be found on Slide #31 of the KBDM PowerPoint)

- 1. Create a framework for discussion Chairperson will frame the discussion to be specific and address the problem simply. Then create a Thought Force or Task Force to work on it. Framework will include: Background, Relevance, Context and Summary.
- 2. Provide all background information before discussion *members of the group share* all information with each other.
- 3. Answer the five KBDM questions *The group uses the five KBDM questions to keep the discussion and process on track.*
- 4. Answer all questions questions are asked until everyone is satisfied and understands what is being worked on.
- 5. Deliberation here is where we express our opinions for or against. This is timed, and everyone gets an opportunity to express one opinion per issue.
- 6. Decision-making if the issue warrants it then a decision is made: (1) a motion based on the process (2) request for more time and information (3) do nothing.

- 1. What do we know about our members (or prospective members) needs regarding this discussion?
- 2. What do we know about the capacity and strategic position of the Area relative to this discussion?
- 3. What do we know about current realities, evolving dynamics of the world and our fellowship's environment that is relevant to this discussion? What are the pros and cons?
- 4. What are the ethical implications of our choices? Will our decision be in line with our spiritual principles?
- 5. What do we wish we knew, but don't?
